Major Concern 1: To Deepen and Sustain Academic Excellence

Feedback and follow-up actions from the previous school year:

The initiatives we outlined in the previous year reflected a strategic approach to enhancing self-regulated learning (SRL), cross-curricular integration, and global engagement, supported by innovative pedagogy and upgraded facilities.

Efforts to innovate SRL have introduced diverse formats such as study groups, peer learning, and collaborative projects, aiming to sustain students' interest and engagement. A culture of reflection is fostered through tools like mistakes books and learning journals, ensuring students evaluate their SRL strategies and outcomes. Reading strategies have been further embedded into subject assessments and dedicated ERaC and CRaC periods, with the S.1–S.2 ERaC SRL Reading Lab enriched through new materials. Additionally, the Literature Out Loud programme and the introduction of the STREAM subject, *Literature Maker*, emphasize Thinking Routines and critical thinking, promoting visible thinking processes and stronger group dynamics.

Cross-curricular learning remains central to cultivating intellectual curiosity and enhancing academic achievement. The STREAM subject, integrated with cross-curricular initiatives, will be supported by upgraded facilities, including a Future Lab and a renovated STREAM Room, to provide a nurturing environment for increased engagement and motivation. Global Week programmes and the Global Virtual Exchange Programme are further strengthening cross-disciplinary collaboration and global dialogue. Thirty students will participate in virtual exchanges with European schools, while junior students will connect theory with real-world applications through cultural explorations and museum visits.

To advance teacher development, SRL lesson studies, supervised by Dr. Stanley Ho from CUHK, and workshops led by experts in values education and questioning skills are being introduced. Open classrooms during Global Week will showcase cross-curricular learning strategies.

Technological integration, including AI tools, e-learning resources, and collaborations with platforms like Coursera and TALIC at HKU, has significantly enhanced creativity, self-regulation, and engagement. All S.3 students are completing MOOCs as part of their assignments, while S.4 students engage in a MOOC x reading curriculum to develop SRL skills. Continued collaboration with City University of Hong Kong will expand these efforts.

Through these comprehensive measures, our school is cultivating critical thinking, global awareness, and self-regulated learners prepared for future challenges.

Major Concern 2: To uphold and enhance Whole Person Development

Feedback and follow-up actions from the previous school year:

The school remains committed to fostering students' holistic development by systematically integrating the Keiyuenese virtues, the Eight Habits of Highly Effective Teens, growth mindset, leadership skills, and information literacy into both the curriculum and co-curricular activities.

Over the past year, 91% of committee activities and 75% of morning assemblies successfully incorporated the Keiyuenese virtues of perseverance and kindness. This year, the school will place emphasis on cultivating the values of love and gratitude. These virtues will be embedded into campus life through classroom instruction, extracurricular activities, themed competitions, and campus decorations.

The growth mindset curriculum in Life Education will be further enhanced to meet junior students' developmental needs. Regarding the reflection tool, 270 student leaders completed the self-assessment questionnaire last year to evaluate their growth mindset and the Eight Habits of Highly Effective Teens. This year, the school will refine the tool to deepen students' self-awareness.

Information literacy remains a key development area. Adjustments will be made to the CL curriculum at both junior and senior levels, and students' understanding of digital literacy and cybersecurity will be reinforced through themed competitions and morning assemblies.

To support students in exploring career pathways, the school will organize a variety of workshops, information seminars, and interactive activities to help students connect academic knowledge with future career options. Structured discussions and peer evaluations of their "i-Portfolio" will also be conducted to foster reflection and meaningful exchange.

Leadership development will be strengthened through targeted training programmes covering mission, responsibility, growth mindset, and the Eight Habits of Highly Effective Teens. S.1 students have shown progress in autonomy and goal setting, while S.2 students have demonstrated excellence in teamwork, empathy, and win-win strategies. S.3 students will be introduced to the Eight Habits of Highly Effective Teens.

Students have achieved outstanding results in academic, artistic, and athletic competitions, reflecting the effectiveness of subject departments and co-curricular teams in nurturing student potential. These teams will continue to encourage active participation, boosting students' confidence and sense of achievement.

The Healthy Lifestyle Promotion Team, in collaboration with the Physical Education Department, has successfully enhanced students' physical and mental well-being through morning runs, Day 6 OLE activities, nutrition seminars, and health journals. The Life Education curriculum includes Social Emotional Learning (SEL) and GRIT elements to further strengthen students' emotional resilience. The school will continue implementing these initiatives to support students' overall development and cultivate a caring and supportive growth environment.
